River Protection Grows in West Fairlee



Odd Dog Farm sits in a broad valley where the Ompompanoosuc River sweeps through low lying grassland. It's an area prioritized by Vermont's Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) because allowing the river to move naturally here will protect water quality and improve flood resilience. With grants from DEC and the Connecticut River Mitigation Enhancement Fund of the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation UVLT has purchased conservation easements along Odd Dog's

Farmland Grant for Blackmount



The conservation of a Haverhill farm took a critical step forward this week with federal approval of a grant that will pay for 50% of the value of a conservation easement. The next step, says UVLT Project Manager Megan Chapman, is applying for state funding for most of the rest of the costs. If successful, this project will conserve 180 acres of

What We Found: Vernal Pools at Brookmead



Our recent Volunteer Training at Brookmead Conservation Area in Norwich included a walk in the woods and learning about the vernal pools there. The photo at left is egg masses of Jefferson salamander, rare in Vermont, and Yellow spotted salamander egg (in the bowl) from one of the vernal pools. Our stewardship plans for Brookmead include

continued observation of vernal pools and studying deer browse impacts on forest species.
